Hi Linda.

If you don't already have it you might add some information to the file on the artist Samuel Jennings, who painted *Liberty Displaying the Arts and Sciences*. He appears to have sent two paintings to the exhibition of the Columbianum. This was the first and only exhibition of America's first, short-lived art academy of the same name. It ran from May 22, 1795 through mid-July 1795. His pictures are listed as nos. 44 and 45 in the catalogue and were portraits of *Benjamin West*, who had just become the second President of England's Royal Academy and a *Mr. Clarkson (no. 45, Portrait of Mr. Clarkson, who wrote against slavery)*. I assume this refers to Thomas *Clarkson* (1760-1846), who was a major British abolitionist. If you want to photcopy the page of the catalogue, its call number is Am 1795 Phil Ap 795 E99 Maybe these pictures are still lurking around Philadelphia!
